The power behind

As April arrives, it brings with it the showers that produce spring flowers. It also marks the beginning of a potentially stormy season that can cause power outages. While Nolin strives to provide reliable electricity to our members, there are times when Mother Nature has other plans.

Most of us can ride out a storm from the comfort and convenience of our homes. However, there is a group of professionals that spring into action when the weather takes a turn for the worst-co-op lineworkers.

One of the most dangerous jobs

Braving stormy weather and other challenging conditions, lineworkers must often climb 40 or more feet in the air, carrying heavy equipment to

> restore power. Listed as one of the 10 most dangerous jobs in the U.S., lineworkers must perform detailed tasks next to high voltage power lines. To help keep them safe, lineworkers wear specialized protective clothing and equipment at all times when on the job. This includes special fireresistant clothing that will self-extinguish, limiting potential injuries from burns

and sparks. Insulated rubber gloves are worn to protect them from electrical shock. While the gear provides protection, it also adds additional weight and bulk, making the job more complex.

In addition to the highly visible tasks lineworkers perform, their job today goes far beyond climbing to the top of a pole to repair a wire. They are also information experts that can pinpoint an outage from miles away and restore power remotely. Line crews use their laptops and cell phones to map outages, take pictures of the work they have done and troubleshoot problems. In our community, Nolin

RECC lineworkers are responsible for keeping 3,000 miles of lines across nine counties working, in order to bring power to your home and our local community 24/7, regardless of the weather, holidays or personal considerations.

While some of the tools that lineworkers use have changed over the years, namely the use of technology, the dedication to the job has not. Being a lineworker is not a glamorous profession. It can be a dangerous occupation, requiring them to work near high voltage lines in the worst of conditions, at any time of the day or night. During tornadoes, wildfires or storms, crews often work around the clock to restore power. While April is known

for spring showers, there is also a day set aside to "thank a lineworker."

Lineworker Appreciation Day is April 9. So during the month of April, if you see a lineworker, please pause to say thank you to the power behind your power. Let them know you appreciate the hard work they do to keep the lights on, regardless of the conditions.

Nolin RECC is proud to provide clean, renewable energy that is delivered more reliably and affordably than ever before.

This year the renewable programs from Nolin and Kentucky's Touchstone Energy Cooperatives have reached new heights because of Cooperative Solar Farm One. Located in Clark County, this 60-acre solar farm is one of the state's largest sun-to-electricity projects, featuring more than 32,000 panels. It produces enough electricity to supply all the power for about 1,000 typical Kentucky homes.

Participants in Cooperative Solar can buy a 25-year license at \$460 per panel to support renewable energy, and it's easy to sign up at www.cooperativesolar. com.

We also offer a program called envirowatts. We started it back in 2003 when we built Kentucky's first renewable energy plants and used the gas from decaying landfill trash to make electricity. There are now six of these plants

in the commonwealth. They are part of an expanded envirowatts program that gives members the option of supporting renewable power generated from wind, water or the sun.
