Smart power strips also give you the option to select which devices should stay in "always on" mode.
- 3. Choose ENERGY STAR-certified office equipment. If you need to purchase new equipment for your workspace, look for the ENERGY STAR label to ensure you're getting the most energy efficient features. Computers, monitors, imaging equipment and other office electronics that receive the ENERGY STAR rating include power management features



to make saving energy easy, and most are designed to run cooler and last longer.

4. Flip the switch and use natural light instead. It's still chilly out there, so take advantage of natural light and additional warmth from the sun. When you're working during the day, open blinds, curtains and other window coverings to let natural light in—and don't forget to turn off the lights to reduce energy use! If you need to have lights on, make sure you are using LED bulbs to light the room or work area.

The garden is located along the trail and is used by students through the school's agriculture classes. The trail serves community partners and local residents as well.
